

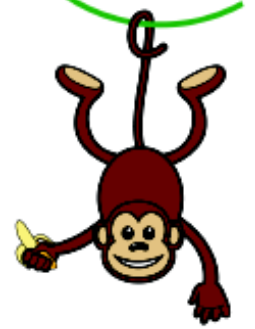


Caring for your cast



You've got your new cast, so now what?

Here's your easy guide to looking after your cast!



About your new cast

Your cast is made of stockinette, wool and a hard covering! Either plaster of paris (the white powdery material similar to mod rock you may have used for crafting!) or a synthetic, light weight material which comes in many colours.

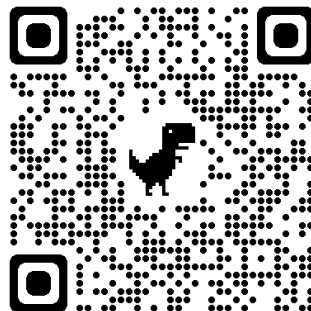
What colour did you choose?

The cast helps to stop your broken bone from moving which helps with the pain. Your cast helps your bone and surrounding tissues to heal.

**Now you've learnt what your cast is made of and why you have to wear one...
how do we take them off?**

We use a special machine to take off your cast! It makes a very loud noise and vibrates very quickly to cut through the hard material of your cast. We then use special safety scissors to cut through the wool and stockinette.

Looking after your cast

Do's

- You must keep your cast clean and dry. If your cast is wet your skin may get sore.
- Keep your arm raised up to help with any swelling. You could use a sling to help you!
- Keep your fingers and toes wiggling. You could play rock, paper, scissors with a friend to help you keep moving!
- Keep your leg rested on a stool or straight out on the sofa using a pillow underneath but make sure your heel is floating in the air!



Don't put anything down your cast! If you have an itch to scratch try our 3 top tips!

- Tap the cast where it itches
- Scratch the opposite arm or leg
- Ask a parent or guardian to get a hairdryer, put it on cold and blow some cold air up and down your cast!

Your parent or guardian might give you some medicine to help you called antihistamines.

You must let a parent or guardian know if...

- Your cast gets wet
- Your fingers or toes look a strange colour
- Your cast is broken or cracked
- Your cast feels tight or loose
- Your cast is making you sore, like when you get a blister from new shoes!
- You put anything down your cast

DID YOU KNOW?

You can decorate your cast with marker pens!
