

After Day Case Breast Surgery

Patient details

Operation

Anaesthetic

A general anaesthetic can stay in your system for 24-48 hours and may make you feel light-headed, dizzy, tired and nauseous (sometimes vomiting). During this time you must refrain from driving, drinking alcohol, smoking, eating heavy, rich, fatty foods, operating machinery, or signing any legal documents.

It is important to rest and drink plenty of fluids.

Wound

Your wound has:

- Dissolvable stitches** - These will dissolve.
- Clips/Stitches** - These will be removed by the on
- Pressure dressing** - remove after 24 hours.

You must however, ensure that the wound remains covered with a dressing until the sutures are removed.

Care of your dressing:

Your dressing should stay in place until

If you need to change your dressing then do not touch your wound or pull off the scab as it protects the underlying tissue.

It is normal for the area underneath the wound to feel thickened and firm for a few weeks. Bruising is common and will disappear in time.

Possible problems:

- Redness around the wound site may be a sign of infection
- Any leakage
- Increased pain
- Fever

If any of these symptoms occur please contact your Breast Care Nurse, the ward or your GP for advice.

Pain

It is normal to have some discomfort which will gradually settle over a few weeks. Take painkillers if required ensuring that you do not exceed the recommended dose. If your pain/discomfort does not improve seek advice from your Breast Care Nurse or GP.

Your next dose of painkillers is due at

Showers/baths

You may have a bath or shower, but do so carefully and keep the wound dressing dry. You may allow the wound to get wet when the dressings have been removed and the wound is clean and dry.

Wearing a bra

You may wear a bra when you feel comfortable. Sometimes you will be most comfortable with one of your older "well worn" bras, a vest style top with secret support, or a soft front fastening bra.

Driving

You will be able to drive after 4 days when you feel capable of controlling your car in an emergency situation. Please check with your insurance company if you are concerned.

Going back to work

You are advised to stay off work for

The amount of time off will depend on your occupation and the extent of your surgery. Please seek advice from the nursing staff prior to discharge, or from your GP. Fitness to work certificates may be obtained from the medical staff prior to discharge or from your GP.
